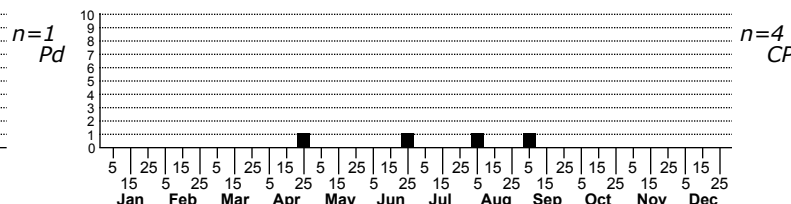
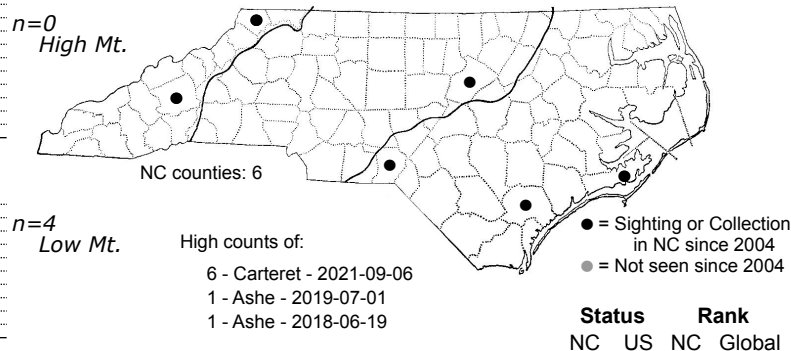
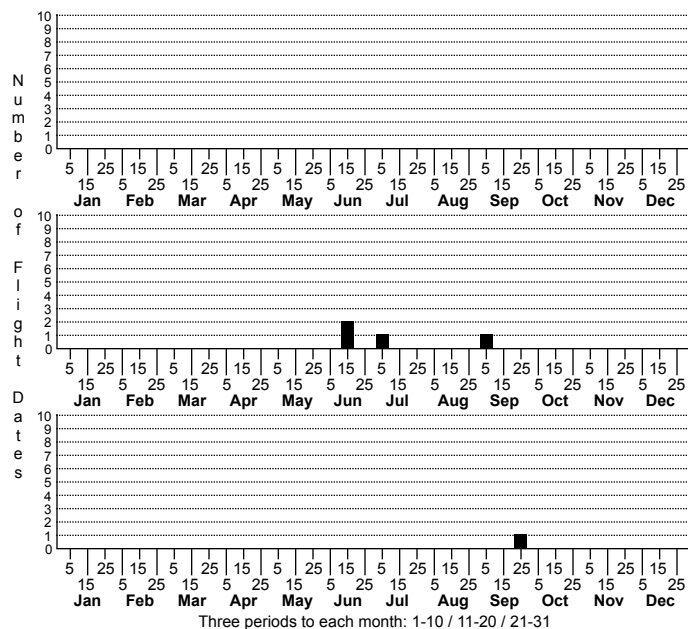


Olethreutes appendiceum Serviceberry Leafroller Moth

HABITAT:

FOOD: The common name 'Serviceberry Leafroller Moth' is a misnomer since this species feeds on a wide variety of mostly deciduous hardwoods (Prentice, 1966; Godfrey et al., 1987; Robinson et al., 2010). The reported hosts include Red Maple (*Acer rubrum*), Sugar Maple (*A. saccharum*), Mountain Maple (*A. spicatum*), Red Alder (*Alnus rubra*), Speckled Alder (*A. incana* subsp. *rugosa*), serviceberries (*Amelanchier*), American Hornbeam (*Carpinus caroliniana*), Sweet-fern (*Comptonia peregrina*), American Hazelnut (*Corylus americana*), American Beech (*Fagus grandifolia*), American Witch-hazel (*Hamamelis virginiana*), American Hop-hornbeam (*Ostrya virginiana*), Quaking Aspen (*Populus tremuloides*), Choke Cherry (*Prunus virginiana*), an oak (*Quercus*), Smooth Sumac (*Rhus glabra*), Red Currant (*Ribes rubrum*), brambles (*Rubus*), willows (*Salix*), Hillside Blueberry (*Vaccinium pallidum*) and a viburnum (*Viburnum*).
